

## Tap Harmonics


Tap harmonics, which have a ringing, bell-like tone, may be produced by tapping with your right hand (index, or middle finger) twelve frets above a note held with your left hand on the same string. Be sure to tap over the fret bar nearer to the bridge.

- Hold down the third string, second fret note A with your left hand.
- Tap your right hand index finger onto the third string, fourteenth fret (twelve frets above the original A note sounded earlier).
- 3. Be sure the harmonic rings out clearly. (Do not let your right hand index finger rest on the fret.)



## Strumming Partial Chords

In the following example, play through all the notes of the chord on the downstroke. On the upstroke, play two, three, or four notes of the chord.



Rounding off your pick's edge with a fine grain sandpaper will give you a smoother pick attack.
